We will continue to offer the Blood of Christ to the assembly. If you wish not to receive, we honor that decision.

As far as holding hands at the Our Father, if those around do not wish to, please honor that.

If you are elderly or have a compromised immune system, be assured you do not have to attend Mass. We will make every effort to see that the Eucharist is brought to your home.

The importance of gathering each and every Sunday is a vital part of our community. If you cannot attend or do not feel comfortable in church, please know our prayers are with you.

As more guidelines come from the Diocese, we will follow those the best way we can. In the meantime, let us pray for God's healing and protection upon our nation and the world in the midst of this Coronavirus scare.
