Instead, his interest is us – you and me!

He is after us — calling us to follow him, to be with him, to join him; teaching us how to love ourselves as he loves us and how to reach out to care for others.

Many of the greatest saints in the history of our Church have come from rich or well-to-do families. "Love of money is the root of all evil." Not money itself, but the "love of money." It is not riches that corrupts the heart, but a refusal to love one another and to care for our poor.

May the Holy Spirit give us the strength and courage to bring forgiveness, light and new life in and around Midtown KC.
