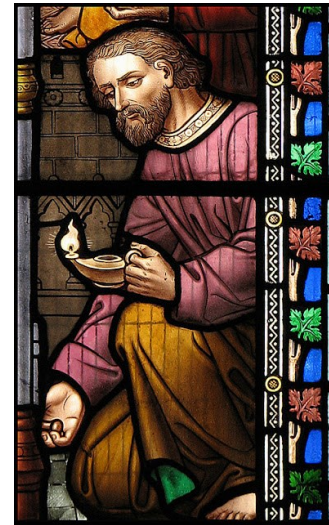

● **HARVESTERS VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY**

There are two February Harvesters volunteer opportunities this month.

The first is our regular volunteer day on Tuesday, February 7, from 6-8 pm. But we can also celebrate the Kansas City Chiefs trip to the Super Bowl by helping out at Harvesters annual Souper Bowl on Saturday, February 11 (the day before the game). Our shift is from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Harvesters is located at 3801 Topping Ave. Volunteers must be 8 years old or older. All volunteers are required to wear closed-toed shoes, long pants, and masks. ● **PAINTINGS**

Father John Augustine Tolton is the first black man ordained a Roman Catholic priest in the United States. Augustus was born to Catholic parents in 1854 in Ralls County, Missouri, a slave state during the Civil War. His father escaped into Illinois, a free state and joined the Union Army. He later died in battle.

Eight years later in 1862, Augustus and the rest of the family crossed the Mississippi River into Quincy, Illinois. The parishioners of the Catholic school in Quincy objected to having a black child in the predominantly white school. So, the pastor instructed Augustus at school and tutored him for entrance to the seminary.

Every seminary in the United States rejected Tolton’s entrance. With great faith and perseverance, he learned Italian and was admitted to the Pontifical Urbaniana University in Rome and was ordained priest in 1886.

His first assignment was to return to Quincy to serve the black community. Soon afterwards, Fr. Augustus was sent to Chicago where he developed the “national parish” of Black American Catholics, St. Monica’s Church, on Chicago’s South Side. In 1891, the church had over 600 parishioners. Fr. Augustus died in 1897 in Quincy. In 2019, Pope Francis granted him the title of “Venerable.” The next step in his canonization would be beatification, which would grant him the title of “Blessed.”

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Reflection from Fr. Garry Richmeier

In the gospel today, Jesus tells his followers "You are the light of the world." During the day, the sun shines and sheds its light on our world. At night, the moon shines and shares its light. But the moon's light is really the sun's light bouncing off it and coming to earth. The moon really has no light of its own. But as the sun's light bounces off it, the moon adds its own shades and hues to the light, making it its own. That's why we call it "moonlight" and not "sunlight bouncing off the moon."

Our sun is the source of light and life for us, just as God's love is the source of life for us. That idea has prompted some to suggest that we are called to be like the moon, reflecting God's light/love to others. Like the moon, our light (who we are) does not originate from us -- it comes from God, and is in fact, God's light/love in us. As we realize where the light comes from, and how it brings life, we reflect it on to others, adding our own shades, hues, and flavors to that light/love.

Sometimes we mistakenly assume we are the sun, that we are the center of the solar system, and that we are the source of everything. That egocentric illusion is the source of much pain and suffering in our world.

It is the light that unites the sun, the moon, and us into one system which maintains life. It is the light of God's love that unites God, me, and everyone else in the dance of life.
