SYNODALITY

"A word for which we need another word."

Recently, I participated in a two-day session on synodality. To tell the truth, it doesn't seem exciting. But, since one of our sisters was giving it, I knew Susan would not waste our time.

When Pope Francis inaugurated the worldwide synod, I thought of an incident many years ago when we re-introduced the catechumenate in the diocese. We put together a little booklet to explain the whole process. We decided to include a glossary at the end to explain terms easily and quickly. Fr. Bill Bowman (RIP), when he came to the word "mystagogia", the period from Easter to Pentecost, he wrote "a word for which we need another word." Synodality is one of these words.

The meaning of the word is not that difficult. It comes from the Greek phrase *sun-odos*: journeying together – as walking together and listening to the spirit. It is very close to the meaning of reconciliation – to walk together again.

Synodality is a process, <u>communal</u>, <u>personal</u>, and <u>participative</u>. We are trying to listen to one another, our neighbor, even those we disagree with often. We are trying to speak the truth intentionally. We are trying to participate, walk with others, be involved. If it feels like you are trying to juggle three objects and eat a sandwich as well, you got the idea. It is what Pope Francis calls getting out of our comfort zone.

We don't really need another word for synodality here at St. James. We just need to keep this communal, personal process going.

Pope allows women to vote at upcoming bishops' meeting

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Francis has decided to give women the right to vote at an upcoming meeting of bishops, an historic reform that reflects his hopes to give women greater decision-making responsibilities and laypeople more say in the life of the Catholic Church.

Francis approved changes to the norms governing the Synod of Bishops, a Vatican body that gathers the world's bishops together for periodic meetings, following years of demands by women to have the right to vote.

The Vatican on Wednesday published the modifications he approved, which emphasize his vision for the lay faithful taking on a greater role in church affairs that have long been left to clerics, bishops and cardinals.

Catholic women's groups that have long criticized the Vatican for treating women as second-class citizens immediately praised the move as historic in the 2,000-year life of the church.

"This is a significant crack in the stained glass ceiling, and the result of sustained advocacy, activism and the witness" of a campaign of Catholic women's groups demanding the right to vote, said Kate McElwee of the Women's Ordination Conference, which advocates for women priests.

Ever since the Second Vatican Council, the 1960s meetings that modernized the church, popes have summoned the world's bishops to Rome for a few weeks at a time to debate particular topics. At the end of the meetings, the bishops vote on specific proposals and put them to the pope, who then produces a document taking their views into account.
