Message from Fr. Don Farnan


As we arrive at the end of our annual calendar, we are given the gift of Christmas, the promise of God coming into our world. It is a past, present, and future reality from which we cannot hide. In these darkest days of shortest sunlight, we greet the spiritual light of Jesus' birth and witness as each day's light grows brighter, longer. Some call this time Saturnalia; some call it the winter solstice; we call it Christmas—when the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. Even those that want to take Christ out of Christmas are thrown for a loop. Though "X-mas" indicates a societal desire to remove Jesus from the equation, "X" actually has sacred origins. The Greek letter "X" or "chi" is the first letter of "Christ" in the language of the Gospels, and it became a common abbreviation by which people referred to the Savior of humanity. "Christ" means anointed, and "mas" means to be sent forth. So "X-mas" is rooted in the notion that, starting with the Twelve Days of Christmas, we, who have been anointed through sacramental life, are sent forth to tell and live the good news of Jesus' presence among us. We are to be the "X" factor that proclaims the incarnational miracle. During these days, with feasts on the Motherhood of Mary, the Epiphany to our world, the Holy Family, and Holy Innocents, Kwanzaa and New Year's celebrations, we contemplate our place in an ever-changing world through ever-changing times.

Each year, people of earth are challenged and divided by war, civil strife, poverty, and government failures. It peaks this year in the land that we call holy, the place of Jesus' manifestation. Just as the Lord informed us that the poor will always be with us so are we reminded that conflict accompanies us through every age. We are challenged to rise above it. The Catholic Church is deeply blessed by its rich tradition and devotion, intellectual and artistic expression, charitable outreach, and hope that it brings amidst the most discouraging circumstances. Pope Francis continues to offer inspiration through an openness and warmth that encourages all people to find solace and purpose in Christ. His concern for the poor and for a collegial church that hears the voice of marginalized citizens can bring healing beyond the spaces where sin and error have corrupted. His desire to appoint pastoral leadership on every continent and to the most remote regions of the globe awakens us to the message of the One born in Bethlehem.

Soon the message of this season will unceremoniously trail away once again, as lights are dismantled and decorations get boxed up and reshelved, and daily routines take center stage. But let us not forget the magic of the season, the luminous event of long ago and far away, the gracefilled moment that gives time and space a focal point for eternity. And let us not forget the "X" factor that makes us players in salvation history. It connects us to the heralding choirs of angels over hills where flocks are shepherded, the assent to God's will by the Virgin of Nazareth and her betrothed, the brilliance of a star that pours forth light to inflame a darkened sky for spiritual travelers, and the courage, obedience, and humility it takes from believers. Christmas is here! Let us pause to take a breath of heaven and capture a glimpse of the miracle before us. Let us also participate in giving birth to peace, joy, hope, and love.
