# Reflection from Fr. Garry Richmeier

As we get closer to the end of the liturgical Church year, which ends with Christ the King Sunday on Nov. 24, the scripture readings at Mass start to focus on the end times and the coming of the Reign of God. It coincides with the season of Fall, when the growing season ends and things appear to die. This is a depressing time for many people because we really don't like good things to end, and we really don't like death. And yet we have these scriptures that seem to haunt us with the less-than-desirable prospect of the end.

We tend to have this deep, down feeling that there is something wrong when pleasant things end, but there is something right when unpleasant things end. In reality, all things end no matter what they are -- there is nothing right or wrong about it. And we tend to feel uneasy or even fearful when something ends and we don't know what will take its place. If it's one thing that most of us dislike, it is uncertainty. But that is also par for the course regarding reality.

So how do we manage these sometimes unpleasant feelings? Hindsight is often helpful. How many endings and beginnings have each of us been through in our life? More than we can count. Some have been unpleasant, even traumatic. Some have been pleasant. And yet we are still here to talk about them all. We've survived, albeit with all the accompanying scars and blessings we've collected along the way. Endings and beginnings are continuous and normal if we are alive. To be uncomfortable with them may be human, but we don't have to fear them. That is what the scriptures may be trying to tell us at the end of the Church year. God has created this reality to work this way, complete with the constant beginnings and endings. And if God has designed it, we can trust it. We may never fully understand it, but that is why it is called "faith." So we embrace this ending of another season and another Church year, turning yet another page in life, trusting that it is another step toward the full reign of God.

#### • STATE OF THE PARISH

At our October 27th Sunday Mass, Martha Belker and Bill Cordaro presented the **STATE of the PARISH address.** It Included the challenges we face and how we plan to address them. It was proposed that we conduct an annual Stewardship Appeal to help better manage our finances. The parish voted 94 to 19 in favor of conducting an appeal. We can't do everything at once, but we can begin some things now.

A Stewardship Appeal is an opportunity for the parish and individual members to reflect on how God has gifted us and how we are called to use our gifts to continue to build the Reign of God. On Sunday, November 24th, we will request parishioners make a 12-month financial commitment to St. James.

All of us are asked to do our part:

- 1. Pray for guidance as you discern how God wants you to use your resources of time, talent and treasure to support the ministry of the parish.
- 2. Read all of the Stewardship Appeal communications.
- 3. Speak with fellow parishioners and family about the appeal.
- 4. Plan to make a one-year financial commitment to St. James on November 24th.
- 5. Ask the Holy Spirit to continue to guide our parish leadership in their decision-making process.
