Reflection from Fr. Garry Richmeier

Many people make New Year's resolutions in January. Many people give up on those resolutions by February. Good intentions are great, but without accompanying planning, perseverance, and effective execution, good intentions don't have much of a chance of producing results. If change in one's life is actually going to happen, it takes much more than good intentions.

Making a realistic plan is one thing needed to effect change. It feels good to imagine that I will be in better physical shape in the new year, or will be more well read, or whatever. But the next step is to get very specific about how to reach that goal. That means lining up the resources needed (sufficient time set aside, money if needed, someone else's help, etc.) Then you plan how exactly to use those resources (the when, where, how details). It is critical that the plan be realistic. Many people have grandiose, unrealistic ideas of what they want to accomplish, but soon realize that they have bitten off more than they can chew and then give up. Matching the goal/plan with the available resources is crucial.

Change also is more achievable if broken up into smaller steps. I may want to lose 30 pounds, but focusing on losing one pound at a time will work better. It takes quite a while to lose 30 pounds, and it's easy to get discouraged and give up. Losing 1 or 2 pounds takes less time and can be encouraging, and a motivation to keep going.

Then there is the perseverance needed to stick with the plan and the execution of the plan. We live in a society that attempts to eliminate the need for perseverance in any endeavor. We'd much rather have a pill to make us lose weight than have to endure the longer haul of eating right and exercising. We want to simply buy a new item when the old one breaks, instead of the more laborintensive fixing of the old item. Quick, superficial relationships are touted as love because true loving relationships take time and perseverance.

Perseverance is a challenge, but some things can help us keep going. Having the support of others can give us a boost when we feel like quitting. Keeping track of small successes is also important, instead of focusing only on the failures. Predicting that we will falter sometimes can lessen the shock of setbacks, and help us start again. And maybe the most important thing is to be gentle and compassionate with yourself. It is almost impossible to persevere with a critical, blaming voice in one's head saying you'll never reach your goal. Most of us need to practice changing that voice to a more encouraging one.

These strategies can help us keep New Year's resolutions, but they can be helpful as a general approach to life's challenges any time of year.

ST. JAMES MOVES CLOSER TO A COMMUNITY-LED PARISH

The nearly 60 parishioners attending Sunday's December 15th parish-wide meeting advanced a proposal to develop and nurture a community-led parish model for St. James Midtown. Community-led means you, the parishioners, take a more active role in determining the future of our parish. Since no parishes in our diocese use this model, we will learn as we go. Communication and transparency are critical for success.

MARK YOUR CALENDARS! St. James will hold parish-wide meetings after Mass on the third Sunday of each month. These monthly meetings will discuss topics impacting St. James and its future and seek parishioners' input. ALL ARE STRONGLY ENCOURAGED TO ATTEND. The parish transition team, consisting of Fr. Don Farnan, Diane Etzel-Wise, Martha Belker, Ben Babaran, and Bill Cordaro, has been asked to guide this process until we have installed our new parish leader. The team will also keep the parish running in the interim.

YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION IS NEEDED.

Communication is critical for the success of a Community-Led Parish. To communicate effectively, we need the parishioner's current contact information. If you are not receiving parish weekly emails or didn't receive the November Stewardship Appeal Packet in the mail, we don't have your correct contact information. Please send your email address, phone number, and mailing address, along with your name. The parish will not sell your contact information at any time.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO ANSWER THE PARISH PHONE.

Community-Led Parish Questions & Answers (Please note that what we are doing is novel for Catholic parishes. Therefore, we are developing the model as we go.)

Q: What kind of parish leadership is needed to move toward a Community-Led Parish?

A: Ben Babaran has been our parish administrator for 10 years. However, moving to a Community-Led Parish requires a different type of leader. One who looks more like a parish organizer than an administrator. An organizer's primary focus is engaging parishioners in making the major parish decisions, engaging them in the parish's work and ministries, and supporting them as they take on more of the parish's responsibilities.

Q: How will the new Parish Organizer be hired?

A: The Transition Team is responsible for identifying a potential organizer. We are composing a job description and plan to post the position with the diocese and other publications that may attract the type of leader we seek. Once a candidate is identified, we plan to bring the candidate to a parish-wide meeting so parishioners can meet the candidate before a contract is offered.

Q: Who will lead the parish while we look for a Parish Organizer?

A: St. James is very fortunate to have so many volunteers in parish leadership roles, and they plan to continue in their ministry. Fr. Don has asked Martha Belker, Bill Cordaro, and Diane Wise to take over Ben's remaining duties.

- 3. After reporting to these civil and law enforcement authorities, report suspected sexual abuse of a minor or vulnerable adult to the Independent Ombudsman, Joe Crayon, at 816-812-2500, if the abuse involves a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph.
