

#### READINGS FOR THIS SUNDAY JAN 26 THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FIRST READING — NEH 8:2-4A, 5-6, 8-10 Ezra and Nehemiah (the religious and political leadership of the day) grounded their work in Scripture. How does Sacred Scripture guide your life?

SECOND READING — 1 COR 12:12-30 OR 12:12-14, 27 Paul uses the human body as an analogy for the many and varied parts of the Christian community. What role would you like to have in your parish?

GOSPEL— LK 1:1-4; 4:14-21 We hear how Jesus began to reveal his true identity as Israel's long-awaited Messiah in his hometown of Nazareth. Have you ever received news that you thought was unbelievable? What was it?

## READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, FEB 2 THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

FIRST READING — MAL 3:1-4 Malachi prophesied a coming messenger who will purify those making offerings to the Lord. How do you prepare for Sunday worship?

SECOND READING: Hebrews 2:14—18 teaches that Jesus was tested and suffered to be merciful and understand our struggles and challenges. What are you facing this week that Jesus could help you with?

GOSPEL— LK 2:22-40 Mary and Joseph received incredible news from Simeon and Anna about the infant Jesus at his presentation in the Temple. Who helps you process startling or unsettling information?

## **CANDLEMAS DAY - February 2**

Candlemas is a feast day celebrating Jesus's presentation in the Temple. It is generally celebrated with lit candles to represent Jesus as a "light to the world." Catholics used to refer to the day as the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Today, it is commonly called the Presentation of the Lord or the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus Christ.

St. James will celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord and Candlemas Day, February 2, by blessing candles. If you use candles for your prayer at home, you can bring them to church to be blessed as part of that day's service. There will be a table at the front where you can put them on for the blessing and then return them home afterward. You may consider marking your candle to ensure you take your candle home.
